Safeguarding Our Community

St. Kizito Parish is committed to ensuring the safety and well-being of every child and vulnerable person in our community!

We are pleased to share a summary of the vital **Child Safeguarding Workshop** held at the Fr. Francis Taylor Hall on **Friday, December 13th, 2025**.

Commitment & Participation

- Sponsor: The workshop was generously sponsored by the St Patrick Missionaries Society.
- Presenters: Led by Father Paul Asu, SPS and assisted by Ms. Ennetie Mbuka.
- Attendance: We had a fantastic turnout with 42 key representatives (90% of intended participants!) from our Small Christian Communities (SCCs), Church Council Executive, and Parish Staff.
- Key Takeaway: Participants affirmed that Safeguarding is everyone's
 responsibility and must be extended to all vulnerable individuals. It is an issue
 that cuts across religious divides, requiring broad sensitisation across the
 entire Chigoneka Parish catchment area.

What We Learned: Core Standards

The training focused on equipping leaders with the knowledge to establish a safer, nurturing environment. We covered four main standards:

- 1. **Understanding Safeguarding:** Knowing what it is and appreciating its fundamental importance based on the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) principles.
- 2. **Creating Safe Environments:** Discussing crucial procedures like safe recruitment, implementing a clear **Code of Behaviour**, mandatory annual training, and effective risk assessment for all parish activities.
- 3. **Reporting Concerns (The 4 R's):** We learned the simplified framework for responding to disclosures of abuse:
 - Recognising (Types of Abuse)
 - Responding (To a Disclosure)
 - Reporting (To appropriate personnel)
 - Recording (Using the official form)
- 4. **Implementation & Monitoring:** Establishing clear accountability through the official reporting hierarchy (SCCs >> Parish Safeguarding Person >> St Patrick's Society Lead).

Never Ever Do Nothing!

A central mandate of the workshop was the response protocol: **Never ever do Nothing!**

- Misuse of Power: We focused on recognising and preventing the improper use of influence through strong policies, ethical training, and leadership accountability.
- Grooming: New focus was given to recognising the stages of grooming—the systematic establishment of trust for exploitation—so staff can proactively prevent it.
- **Digital Safety:** Clear guidelines were set for electronic communication with minors, including **no private messaging** and using clear boundary settings.

Victim-Survivor First Approach

The training emphasised a trauma-informed approach:

- The role of the person receiving a disclosure is to listen, believe, and report—NOT to investigate or judge.
- Participants are mandated to offer immediate referrals to professional support services (counselling, police contacts) and maintain strict confidentiality.

This workshop marks an important step in our continuous commitment to creating a protective and nurturing environment for everyone in our care.
